## Acts 13:36

David had 'twisted the lid' - discovered God's life theory, adopted it as his own and served his generation with it.

- What does living opposite to Acts 13:36 look like? (Judges 2:8-10)
- 1. Twisted Lid theory #1 Make much of Jesus (Luke 12:15-21)
- How can we "make much of Jesus" through our possessions, money, family and work?
- How does this serve our generation?
- 2. Twisted Lid theory #2 Look after the ordinary
- In what way did David 'look after the ordinary' before He became King?
- Why does God often choose to work through the 'ordinary'?
- 3. Twisted Lid theory #3 LIVE READY.

"If you want to serve your generation be WIDE AWAKE - look for opportunities and jump at them"

- Why do we wait before jumping in and doing something for our generation?
- How can we start jumping in this week?
- 4. Twisted Lid theory #4 THINK GENERATIONALLY
- Why is it vital for us to think cross-generationally as a community / church?
